

COMPOST TEA



Compost tea made from worm castings can be sprayed on leaves or added to the soil, forming a protective barrier against bad fungi and bacteria. Repeated applications revitalize the soil and allow the cultivation of plants without the need for chemical fertilizers and pesticides.

INSTRUCTIONS

Step 1. Fill bucket with water. Set up aeration pump and run the pump for at least 1 hour, but no longer than 24 hours, to remove the chlorine from the water.

Step 2. Add to the water: 2 tablespoons of sugar, 2 ounces Age Old™ Liquid Kelp, 2 ounces Age Old™ Humic and 1 ounce Age Old™ Optimize.

Step 3. Place 1 pound of Age Old™ Earthworm Castings into sock and suspend the casting into the bucket for at least 24 hours, but no more than 48 hours.

During the entire brewing process and storage period, keep pumping air into the solution. This will keep the organisms in the tea active and alive. Use the brew within 24 hours after the brewing process is complete. If you want the tea to last longer, you can use the aeration pump constantly and it will last up to 10 to 14 days. You will know when your tea has gone bad by the smell. Trust us.

HOW TO USE THE TEA:

GARDENS, FLOWERS AND ORNAMENTALS: Mix tea at a ratio of 3 parts water to 1 part compost tea. Apply directly to the soil. Repeat applications every 7 to 10 days during growing season. It is recommended to discontinue usage at least 2 weeks prior to picking.

TURF AND LARGE ACREAGE: Apply to soil 2 weeks prior to planting at a rate of 10 gallons per acre. 2 to 3 weeks after emergence, spray crop with 5 gallons of tea per acre in sufficient water for proper coverage. Repeat application monthly.
